

Maths


In Maths this week we have been describing 2-D and 3-D shapes by their properties, such as: faces, edges and vertices.

The angles of a 2D shape are sometimes referred to as 'vertices' (singular: vertex). For example, this 2D shape has four sides and four angles (vertices):




The faces are the flat parts of the shape. The edges are the lines where two faces meet. The vertices are the points where two or more edges meet.

For example, this 3D shape has 6 faces, 12 edges and 8 vertices:



Some 3D shapes, like cubes and pyramids, can be opened out and unfolded into a flat shape. The unfolded shape is called the net of the solid. We have made some shapes using their nets.



English

In English, we started analysing the characters in 'Romeo and Juliet'. In Grammar, we have been learning about the use of formal and informal language in writing. The main thing to remember is that both are correct, it is just a matter of tone and setting. Formal English is used mainly in academic writing and business communications, whereas Informal English is casual and is appropriate when communicating with friends and those close to us. The children should choose their style of writing keeping in mind who they are writing to. We looked at the use of phrasal verbs as a form of informal language. Phrasal verbs consist of a verb plus a preposition. The preposition can change the meaning of the verb completely, e.g.:

Formal	Informal
apologize	say sorry
increase	go up
decrease	go down
establish	set up
examine	look at
